14b. Engages in sociodramatic play

Why It's Important

When you make writing materials available to your child, you provide him with a purposeful opportunity to practice scribbling with the intention of communicating. He may also enjoy imitating the various ways he sees adults write and use print in everyday situations.

Materials

Notepad; pencils; pretend kitchen materials; pretend restaurant materials

What You Do

- 1. Assemble restaurant props for your child to play with. Include a notepad and pencils.
- 2. Show the new materials to your child. Invite him and other children to use the materials and props during their play.
- 3. If your child does not discover them on his own, point out the writing materials. *I heard you* say you are making chicken and rice. Here are paper and pencils in case you want to write down all of the ingredients you'll need for cooking.
- 4. Ask your child questions to keep him engaged in play. *How does your spaghetti taste? Are you enjoying your cheeseburger? Who is paying for lunch?*
- 5. You can provide props for other play scenarios, such as a doctor's office, post office, and a grocery store. Keep the props available for as long as your child is interested in using them.
